SITE NOTES: NEEMA Foundation for the Deaf:

Neema (pronounced Néma), which means God's Grace in Swahili, is a Non-Profit Organisation formed in 2017. The Foundation is aimed at empowering and positioning deaf and hard-of-hearing people in South Africa and across the continent, particularly women, youth and children, in the marketplace.

Women, youth and children are generally vulnerable across the world. This is significantly worse when they are deaf or hard of hearing. They face enormous challenges, ranging from attaining an education, starting a business, or obtaining employment, remarkably preventing their economic and social independence.

In an attempt to close this gap, the NEEMA Foundation for the Deaf was formed. Its goal is to make a meaningful difference in the lives of deaf and hard-of-hearing people, especially women and youth. The foundation provides platforms, tools and mechanisms that help them actively engage in the economy of the African continent.
